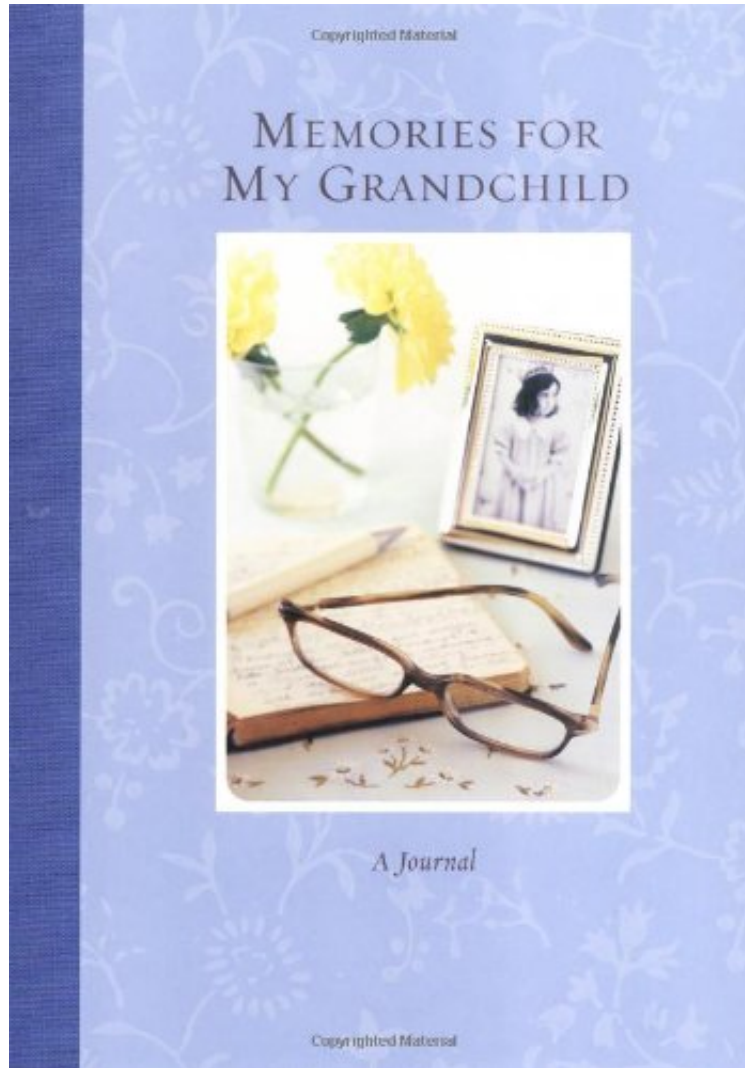

It had a lot of questions and a lot of space to fill out, which I thought was great but I didn't consider that my grandfather is a man of few words, so there was still a lot of space left after he answered. I guess that is okay, but I wish now I would have considered that before I purchased and gotten something with less room to explain and more questions with short answers. Also, I noticed a lot of the questions he didn't really have responses to, for instances under "where did your family vacation while growing up?" or "what was your bedroom

like?" (paraphrased, of course) but when he filled it out he simply wrote, "didn't go anywhere, too poor" or "too poor to have our own bedrooms". I think that sometimes we all forget that those my grandfather's age (he is 85) did not have the luxuries that we have today, and I hope I didn't make him feel uncomfortable or inadequate by asking questions such as that. But otherwise, and overall, I'm really glad I have this book and, at least, a few of his memories for me and my kids to remember him by.

This one, "did u really walk through five feet of snow" and "memories for my grandchild" (blue with little birds on front)--I think which one is best depends on your grandparent. If they are the type who don't want to take the time, then "did u really walk through five feet of snow" might be best choice. It has less questions, more space for response, the questions aren't very "deep" ( did u like carrots when u were my age and who were your best friends when u were young), the book is smaller because less questions, the questions are written by kids, not much delving in to the gparents past with much depth. It's a nice book but if I were filling out a journal for my gkid I'd want the nitty gritty for them to hand down to each generation. The book with birds was my second favorite compared to this one. This one has more questions. More in depth. I like the feel of the book. The style of paper. The spiral binding. If I were filling out a journal id choose this one "memories for my grandchild". HOWEVER if your gparent doesn't like this journaling stuff then this one may be toooooo long and too much. If that's the case then I'd either go with memories for my gchildren (birds in front) or give this and not expect it to all be filled out (what I'm going to do because my gma doesn't like to delve in to the past much. )

By CourtneyI have purchased many of these books (Grandfather Remembers: Memories for My Grandchild, For My Grandchild: A Grandmother's Gift of Memory (AARP), Grandmother Remembers: A Written Heirloom for My Grandchild, A Grandparent's Legacy: Your Life Story in Your Own Words, Memories for My Grandchild, A Grandparent's Book, Grandparents' Memory Book: Did You Really Walk Five Miles to School?) because it's impossible to tell from reviews which ones will be good and the "Look Inside" is often unavailable or unhelpful. I will look at all of them and keep the one I like or make my own, depending on the results.

Second Review of the bunch: Although this is my second review, I have perused all of the other books mentioned above and aside from the lame cover, this one is near the top if not the best. It is a hardbound-covered spiral book. The pages are thick and semi-smooth. The sections are well organized with some bits repeating. For example, there are sections for Childhood, Teenage Years, Entering Adulthood and Today (and a few others) and the first part of each section repeats things like: My address, my favorite food, the view from my bedroom window, cost of a movie, significant world event, etc. This provides a nice way to see how things have changed over time. Also, this book does not focus too much on religion or any other religious holidays. Whenever religion is mentioned it's listed as "religion/spirituality," which is nice because it accommodates just about anyone. Also, they sort of deal with divorced parents a little. There are many questions on various subjects and I feel like it has a good variety compared to my quick perusal of some of the other books. If you can get over the stupid cover, I think this one should be a contender for just about anyone.
